SASKATCHEWAN Infant Formula Program

January 2013 - March 2017

Breastfeeding increases the risk of transmission of HIV from mother to infant.

The Canadian Pediatric Society recommends that all women who are HIV positive use infant formula and not breastfeed their babies¹.

The cost of formula can be a financial burden. In January 2013, the Saskatchewan Infant Formula Program was created. Infants born to women who are HIV positive qualify for free infant formula until their first birthday.


Since the program began, 110 infants born to women living with HIV have qualified and benefitted from the Saskatchewan Infant Formula Program.

The program is coordinated by Infant Formula Program Coordinators who provide support to the entire province, including on and off-reserve locations.
